Bordeaux, France Taste your way through the region

Legendary châteaux open their gates for this six-day/five-night tour. Highlights include tasting an older vintage of Pétrus, private meals at Classified Growth estates, a visit to the Museum of Wine in Art at First Growth Château Mouton Rothschild as well as a tour and tasting at Château d'Yquem. Guests stay at one of the oldest Grands Crus of Bordeaux (first harvested in 1252), Château Pape Clément, named after its founder and most famous owner, Pope Clement V. Dining opportunities feature Michelin-starred restaurants as well as small-gem local favorites. Guides, which may include a Master of Wine or a James Beard award-winning author, share insider knowledge about the futures market, where to purchase Bordeaux wines and importance of provenance. "We help wine lovers become connoisseurs," says Pascale Bernasse, president of French Wine Explorers.
